A MESSAGE FROM JOE PARISI, DANE COUNTY EXECUTIVE:



Dane County is proud to have championed the dementia friendly initiative for more than a decade. Since 2013, our staff and partners have worked hard to raise awareness about dementia, create a network of community resources, and build a dementia friendly community through trainings, special events, memory care kits, and more.

My 2024 budget continues to invest in the ADRC by creating a fulltime Dementia Care Specialist for the

purpose of Alzheimer's Family Caregiver Support Program administration. The program, which provides caregiver grant funding for dementia support, was previously administered by the Alzheimer's and Dementia Alliance of Wisconsin. This position allows the program to be brought into Dane County Human Services for internal administration and continued success.

I want to send a special thank you to ADRC staff, the Dementia Friendly Community Coalitions of Dane County, and the many volunteers who have helped make this initiative a success. The ADRC plays a pivotal role in the Dane County Department of Human Services, and I look forward to the work we will accomplish in 2024.

As we begin 2024, we reflect on all of the achievements, small and large, accomplished in the last year. - Gained an additional 0.5 Dementia Care Specialist


2023 Dementia Statistics

• More than 55 million people worldwide have Worldwide dementia. By 2030, this is expected to grow to 75 million, and by 2050, it is predicted to be at 132 million. • Every year, there are nearly 10 million new cases. (World Health Organization) • 6.7 million Americans age 65 and older have Azheimer's disease. 73% are age 75 or older. By 2050, this number is expected to grow to 12.7 million. **United States** About 1 in 9 people age 65 and older (10.7 %) have Alzheimer's disease. An estimated 1.4 million Americans have Lewy Body Dementia. • 1 in 3 seniors dies with Alzheimer's or another dementia. Between 2000 and 2019, deaths from Alzheimer's more than doubled, while deaths from heart disease decreased. (Alzheimer's Association, Johns Hopkins Medicine) • In 2020, the number of people aged 65 and older with In Wisconsin Alzheimer's in WI was **120,000**. By 2025, that number is predicted to raise to 130,000. • 213,000,000 hours of unpaid care by family caregivers • 7th leading cause of death (Alzheimer's Association, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention)


COTTAGE GROVE

W.S. MIDDLETON MEMORIAL VA HOSPITAL, MADISON

In 2017, in partnership with Dane Co. ADRC, Madison VA was recognized as the first Dementia Friendly Hospital (DFH) in the Veterans Affairs system. Since then, we have made lasting changes to staff education and continue to make environmental improvements - recently, even changing signage to make restrooms more caregiver-friendly and gender neutral. The DFH Task Force works closely with the highly-regarded Madison VA Caregiver Support Program and the Madison VA Dementia Care Coordinator on strategic planning and outreach, enabling greater growth and effectiveness for all programs. Some of the 2023 highlights included a highly sought-after presentation on the VA DFH model, an information fair for the Longest Day, and in November, we celebrated our 7th anniversary of being a DFH by collaborating with the VA Caregiver Support and the Wisconsin Alzheimer's Association to host an informational session and resource fair with Former Governor Martin Schreiber.



In support of Alzheimer's Disease and other dementias, many memory cafe participants and members of Dane Counties' Dementia Friendly Communities teamed up to make ornaments (pictured right) to don the Governor's Mansion holiday trees. Each ornament was filled with a photo of a fond memory, and participants enjoyed reminiscing about the photos they chose, as they constructed them. Reminiscing is just one of the many activities incorporated in Memory Cafes.
